

Upon Further Reflection

Spring Cleaning

Breathe deeply and smell the fresh air – spring is here! This is the time when many of us begin to look askance at the dingey build-up that has accumulated around our yards, homes, closets, and drawers over the winter. The grime and clutter have been there for a while, but now we see it with renewed energy. The change of seasons brings light into our homes, flowers into our landscape, and a bit less rain in our skies. We have the hope of summer in our hearts. The confluence of all these streams of energy gives rise to the phenomenon known as "spring cleaning."

The power of this moment is that spring cleaning has a very positive connotation. "Cleaning" on its own is met with a much more middling response, but mention "spring cleaning" and you will brighten someone's eyes. Do you resonate with the description of spring in this passage from Song of Songs 2:11-13?

"See! The winter is past; the rains are over and gone.
Flowers appear on the earth; the season of singing has come,
the cooing of doves is heard in our land.
The fig tree forms its early fruit; the blossoming vines spread their fragrance.
Arise, come, my darling; my beautiful one, come with me." (NIV)

This passage reveals that our emotional connection to this time of year stretches back across millennia.

I think it is fitting that "Spring Cleaning" generally takes place in the weeks surrounding Easter Sunday. The function of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter is to recognize the deep cleansing and renewing work of Christ's life, death, and resurrection. We come through on the other side reminded that death doesn't have the last word. We are assured of our own forgiveness and wholeness through the work of God in Christ. By God's grace and love, we are clean within. A beautiful way to express our spiritual vitality is to make things clean and fresh in our lived environments as well.

So as you engage in spring cleaning (or begin to think about diving in), I encourage you to let it be a spiritual practice. With this cleansing and ordering, we can express the good work that God has done (and continues to do) in us and in the whole created world. Thanks be to God for this indescribable gift!

Sabbatical Pastoral Supply

We are grateful to Rev. Steve Parker for agreeing to serve in the role of Sabbatical Pastoral Supply for the summer while Pastor Matt is on sabbatical. A passion for working with congregations through the Committee on Ministry and as staff of the Presbytery of the Cascades has also characterized ministry. My philosophy of preaching is to speak in plain language, interpreting the rich treasures of scripture and addressing the common concerns of modern life. Working closely with the music staff of the church has always been a deep interest of mine, and as a musician I thoroughly enjoyed helping lead worship."

Getting to Know our Latino Neighbors

There are several ways that congregation members can support Unidos Bridging Community and our Latinx community. FPC has supported Unidos for a number of years. They advocate for Latino immigrant families and work to build bridges of support and understanding.

Unidos has been holding monthly vaccination clinics in areas of the county where there are low vaccination rates. Volunteers are needed to do things like setting up and taking down, wiping down clip boards, or passing out toys to children.

On May 15th Unidos will be cooperating with several other organizations to drive in caravan to the Tacoma detention center. The Caravan will bring attention to the plight of immigrants being held there. Since detentions centers are for-profit companies, they have little incentive to move the

migrants on. The Caravan will also remind legislators to appropriate funds where needed and reform some existing unfair laws. It would be great to have FPC represented in this Caravan of cars promoting justice.

In the fall Unidos will begin their Citizenship classes again and they are looking for teachers. Volunteers don't need teaching experience as they will just be guiding participants through their workbooks. Unidos provides training, and experience as a helper, to get you started. The commitment is only for four sessions! (They have both an English and a Spanish class so you can help in the language of your choice)

Another volunteer opportunity is helping with data entry that you can do from home. Whatever your interest, there is a way to help. These are some great opportunities to get to know our neighbors. For more information email info@unidosyamhillcounty.org.

The April meeting of the Mission Ministry Team convened at the facilities of the Yamhill County Gospel Mission (The Mission), one of our longtime partners. The team conducted their meeting in the newer Men's Facility (very impressive) and we were hosted by Kaye Sawyer, Executive Director of The Mission. Kaye provided background information about The Mission and led us on a nice tour of the three buildings at this location (corner of 14th and Logan Street).



This facility is providing a valuable service to disadvantaged or homeless people in our community and is helping First Presbyterian live out the Matthew 25 charge we received from Jesus. "When did we feed you, clothe you, shelter you, Lord? Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters, you did it unto me".



The Mission is changing lives and providing physical, emotional, and spiritual revitalization of hundreds of its clients every year. They provide short-term and long-term (up to 30 days) lodging and meals, overnight lodging, and a cold weather shelter for many of our friends who find themselves in difficult circumstances.

Our church supports The Mission not only through your pledges but by "loaning" two of our members, Dave Haugeberg and Dave Widen, to The Mission Board of Directors. Your pledges over the years have helped our church support local missions such as The Mission. Thank you.

Earth Care Corner

May 26th - SEEDLING GIVE-AWAY event on the Labyrinth, Thursday, May 26th from 11 am-3 pm (during Thursday Farmers Market). This will be a free give-away of garden and/or landscape seedlings grown by members or friends of our church. We will give away left over puzzles from our event last year. This is an extension our Earth Day celebration. Visit our tents at 11 am then walk to Thursday Market which opens at 12 noon.

In spite of pouring rain and blowing winds, we had fun, last year, visiting with our church family and reaching out to the local community. By growing our own gardens and purchasing local produce we tread lightly on God's earth.

June 4th – McMinnville Recycled Art and Sustainable Living Festival sponsored by Zero Waste at the Yamhill County Fairgrounds. View and/or purchase recycled art by local artists. Bring your James Recycling items from 10 am -2 pm. Cost is \$4 per grocery bag of plastics. Similar items should be bagged together by number. Caps should be bagged in a separate sack. Those with numbers include 1, clear clamshells, cups; 2,4,5 and 6, such as hot drink cups and lids, prescription pill bottles, small plant pots, and small tubs (For more specifics, check the James Recycling website).

Earth Care input from our church family

Star Thomson has been taking the OSU Extension, Master Gardener Class. She shared the following gardening tip:

Coconut coir is an earth friendly product which can be used instead of products containing peat. Coconut coir is the woody outer husks essentially the waste product of coconut milk and coconut flesh. This byproduct can be used to make compressed soils and mulches for gardening. Coconuts are a highly renewable resource—they can be harvested every 75 days without harming the tree, and a single tree can produce up to 150 coconuts per year.

Traditionally, peat moss is used in gardening as a soil amendment. However, it typically takes up to 220 years to replace one year of peat moss harvested from peat bogs.

PlantBest coconut coir gardening product comes in a block which can be soaked with water in a wheelbarrow for 10 minutes. It breaks apart and expands six times in size. This product can be purchased in Costco warehouses and Costco.com (Information taken from April Costco Connection Magazine)
